# Living out our mission in 2021

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Leonard Cohen, the legendary Canadian poet and singer wrote these powerful lyrics in his 1992 song “Anthem”:

Ring the bells that still can ring  
Forget your perfect offering  
There is a crack, a crack in everything  
That’s how the light gets in.

## Finding Our Way Through

At no point would I say that the 2020-2021 year of ministry at ESG was a perfect offering, but I would argue that we rang every bell we could still ring and the sound of connections resonated. COVID changed another year at ESG. When it began we didn’t know what would happen with our church family or with the ministry we call home. We moved into our life of faith customarily connected to a physical space and focused instead on the faith within us.

Knox McCoy wrote, in *All Things Reconsidered*, about a time when he changed churches because of a move. “Change will do you good – it forces you to act,” he wrote, “But even more deeply, we’ve had to reconsider the idea that action, involvement, and our presence in a physical church is a substitute for the activity of our faith. At different points, the act of participating in ministry within a church took priority over a deeper, more necessary process of thinking and feeling and, most of all, experiencing our faith.” This passage spoke to me in this Covid season; we strengthened our connections by not being at church. Worshipping online has allowed us to be church from Whitehorse to Truro, Northern Ontario to Quebec, Goose Bay, Labrador to Sarnia and beyond as we experienced our faith in new ways. Alone. Together.

Our ministries have expanded; the messages and songs of resurrection, new life, faith, and hope at ESG have released us into something new and something more. Tenacious blooms find their way through cracks.

I am grateful to Susan Moore for her incredible support and leadership as she finishes her term as chair of Governing Council. I look forward to working with Maggie Wilkinson in that role. I am grateful for all of the lay leadership offered so freely. You are all bellringers! Sarah and Don have continued to lead, connect and care for this ministry. Shawn has ensured wonderful music with the choir and leads. Jennifer has kept ESG working smoothly. AJ and Alvaro have looked after the building. Irina has kept the financial system in order. Kate has created over a hundred videos for children and Aidan has maintained his connection with youth. I am so grateful to work with them and appreciate the incredible spirit and gifts they each bring!

# Supporting our Faith Community

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## Adult Education

This year, we focused on offering support to the congregation during a difficult time of lock-downs related to Covid-19. This included:

- Weekly **We are Not Alone** newsletter with topics to reflect, stimulate new thinking, and nurture the soul.
- Weekly **Community of Care** group with an average attendance of 12-16 people. The topics dovetailed with the Tuesday newsletter or the sermon topics. The small group discussions were rich and the prayer time was appreciated. It featured a shared leadership model.
- Three-part webinar on **Coping with Covid-19 Anxiety** led by Mary Thomson. The zoom sessions were well attended by approximately 60 people from across the country.
- **Bible for Busy People** led by Stephen Milton from LPCC
- Two part series on **Living a Meaningful Life During Covid**. Patti Thompson led 2 groups of New Perspectives members.
- **Living your Values**: The Flourish House members were given one-on-one coaching sessions to mine their values followed by a group discussion on how to live their values in community.

**In 2021-22, adult education will focus on virtual or hybrid programming. This will include:**

- **Dealing with Uncertainty**: a two part series delivered by Mary Thomson. How can we move towards the things that we value and away from fear?
- **Food Justice Series**: Offer support to the 7 week Sunday series with a panel discussion and book study.
- **Bible for Busy People** led by Stephen Milton beginning this fall with the Symbolism of Weddings in the Bible.
- Weekly **Circle of Care** reflection and prayer session.
- **Faithful Green Action Group** organized by the North Toronto Cluster will offer discussion sessions on documentaries and books.
- **Scenes from a Life**: a series where participants have an opportunity to reflect on their lives through a number of different lenses.
- **Reconsider Self, Life, Beliefs: Focus on Indigenous spirituality**. A series based on the book *Ladder to the Light, an Indigenous Elder's Meditations on Hope and Courage* by Steven Charleston
- **Embracing Aging** on-going educational sessions tailored to meet COVID realities

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## Church Community Engagement

### Leadership Appointments:

We also approved a new role on Council, Member at Large Church Community Engagement with **Donna MacCandlish** stepping into that position. We are very fortunate, in each case, for the talent and experience these leaders bring to their important roles.

### Winter 2021 Community Engagement Ambassador Initiative:

Building on our earlier Ambassador Calling initiative, we engaged in a second round of calls to members and friends of ESG. Once again, the intent was to check in on how they were faring as COVID endured, offer a listening ear, as well as learn about their strategies for navigating related challenges. It was also a great opportunity to remind folks of the many ways they can connect with ESG, talk about our re-branded website, gather feedback and, where the conversation warranted, find out more about their interests and ways in which they value engaging.

### Coffee Hour Hosting:

Prior to Christmas we reached out, through our Ambassadors, to invite individuals to help with our virtual coffee hour. Response to our invitation was quick and enthusiastic. We held a group tutorial to kick off the effort with **Peter Wilkins** as our master tutor. We then teamed up our volunteers with experienced mentors (**Christine Lawson, Doug Reid and Jim Black**) who had been hosting sessions over the summer and fall. It proved to be a great opportunity to share the load, provide a learning opportunity for those involved and foster leadership.



### Percolating Sessions:

In late winter we engaged congregants in open discussion to help inform our Flourish team regarding communications, current and future programming and our then evolving brand strategy. These Percolating Sessions were well attended and the feedback highly valuable.

## Pastoral Care

Covid 19 continued to challenge our abilities to be together with family, friends and those we cherish. Thankfully we were able to stay connected through cards, phone calls and some different, creative initiatives.

In place of our fall Seniors Luncheon, a team from **Pastoral Care**, **Last Minutes** and **New Perspectives** collaborated to deliver packages of baked goods to those who would typically attend our luncheons. We included a cover letter from our Pastoral Care team with colour copies of our very uplifting 2020 annual report. The response was terrific. Folks were touched by the gesture and appreciated receiving so much news about what was happening at ESG. We repeated a goodies bag drop-off again in the Spring, this time with a letter and update from **Don Parsons**, our Minister of Pastoral Care.



Don has been busier than ever. In addition to his usual contacts, he has pro-actively reached out, with thanks, to each participant in our online worship services (musicians, readers, candle lighters, etc.) and has responded weekly to numerous emails from folks who have watched our services online.

We presided over eight funerals this last year in our sanctuary, at funeral homes and grave-sides. Due to COVID protocols these have been confined to small numbers of family and close friends attending. While limited in terms of in-person attendance, the services held in our sanctuary have been intimate and meaningful enhanced by our ability to live-stream them to engage those from near and afar.

Individual ESG members and teams contributed to our collective pastoral care in innovative ways to keep us connected and to nurture our needs. **We Are Not Alone**, offered on Tuesdays, provided a rich selection of reflections, poetry, music and prayers sourced from among our members with themes often chosen to tie into our Sunday services. Building on this work our **ESG Community of Care** has connected people on Wednesday mornings via Zoom to extend the discussion, inspire and soothe the soul. Many thanks to **Patti Thompson** and **Peter Wilkins** for their significant contributions in bringing these programs to us.

# Extending Our Reach

## Outreach and Social Justice

September 10th marked the first anniversary of the **Little Free Pantry** at ESG. The food Pantry provides a solution to an immediate and local need for food or a need to give. The Pantry is stocked daily with non-perishable food items and personal care products. The **Good Food Box** continued twice monthly with over 20 boxes going to those in need. A local grocer also donated fresh produce to the Na Me Res Shelter for Indigenous men. The **Out-of-the-Cold Program** is on hold; however, we were able to support those living on the street with 200 portions of banana bread. Last Spring, ESG supplied 18 **Welcome Baskets** to Street to Homes, an organization helping people transition from shelters to permanent homes. Another 10 baskets are planned for October. A Winter Coat drive was held to benefit the residents of the Roehampton Hotel Shelter. Benevolent donations continued to numerous Pandemic partners including; The Massey Centre, Toronto Urban Ministry, Fred Victor and St. Luke's Out-of-the Cold Program to name a few.

**Peace with Justice** continued monthly meetings on Zoom to discuss concerns regarding human rights, peace and justice. They also arranged Amnesty International letter writing.

# Extending Our Reach

## Project Flourish

The work of the Project Flourish Team over these last few months has included:

- growing ESG's presence with a broader audience as we implemented our new branding strategy including updates to our website that are more user friendly and reflect our growth orientation;
- working with digital communications to establish points of connection for a broader community including a more active social media presence for ESG;
- based on research and the feedback from some of our ESG initiatives, we recommended a congregational focus on an integrated Food Ministry in order to connect with more people and serve those in need. We believe that a Food Ministry could be a space where people could learn, grow, find community and comfort.

Our work has already begun. The community garden offers space for people in our community to grow their own food, find connection with others and provides meaningful employment experience to teenagers through our Grow Staff program. We held nine online dinner church experiences called **Love aLIVE** in partnership with the Skylight Festival (a faith justice and arts festival) and had between 40-65 people at each experience, hosting people from all over Canada. Our **Cultural Kitchen Parties** invite someone from a specific culture to share both their cooking wisdom and how their food intersects with their spiritual life.



# Extending Our Reach

**Flourish House** continues to be home to three young adult residents and a hub for young adults seeking transformational community. Our residents co-led Love aLIVE events, hosted weekly meals and young adult conversation, led Sunday vespers, led an ESG Sunday morning worship, participated in a values-based workshop, planned a mental health series and transformed their backyard space into unique space for gathering and discussing their spirituality. There are over 40 young adults connected to Flourish House where they find refuge from loneliness and isolation.



The Flourish Team is cooking up (pun intended!) more plans for this important food ministry and look forward to further exploring these opportunities in the year ahead! We are working on a **Community Kitchen** housed at ESG. It would offer food-based programming, including cooking classes, an outreach meal program and other great ideas we are developing. The hope is that this unique ministry would connect with social justice advocates and foodies who understand the connection between food, community, justice, and spirituality.

## Family Ministry

Traditionally the Family Ministry program ends at the end of June each year. However, due to the success of the Sunday School lessons on the ESG Facebook page, it was decided to continue them through the months of July and August. Kate with the assistance of her daughter Charlie continued to post lessons weekly. The curriculum was adapted to correspond to the ESG worship schedule and included special lessons focused on anti-racism, prejudice, and stereotypes during Lent.

**Kids Zoom Time with Kate** continued weekly on Sunday mornings at 10 am from September to the end of June. It was an opportunity for small groups of kids to connect with their friends and enjoy Bible stories, games, and crafts.

Sarah and Kate organized and delivered **Advent boxes** that contained Advent candles and family-friendly worship materials.

We staged a Covid-friendly **virtual Christmas Pageant** this year. Even the barnyard animals were wearing their masks! Costumes and props were safely delivered across the city to our families. Bryan Estabrooks used his amazing editing skills to add background scenes and music. The video received over 800 views on the ESG Facebook page. A Christmas Zoom party was also organized and the kids made and decorated graham cracker houses.

A fun **Pancake Supper** was also celebrated virtually in February. Participants were encouraged to share recipes and photos of their homemade pancakes. A trivial game of Kahoot!, based on the history of Pancake Day was played during the evening. The festivities continued with a timed pancake toss. Prizes and certificates were awarded to all the contestants. Our outreach charity, House of Lazarus, was highlighted during the evening and several families contributed funds to this organization.

Families celebrate Easter by learning about the symbols of Easter, decorating eggs, and making edible Easter baskets. On Easter Day we celebrated with a family **Resurrection Scavenger Hunt** on Zoom. A **virtual Palm Sunday Pageant** was also planned. Thanks to the support of our ESG families, it was a very successful production.

In June, Sarah and Kate planned a special graduation ceremony to celebrate seven Sunday School children. A slide show of these amazing kids and highlights from their journey through the church school program was shown.

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## Worship

This past year continued to prove challenging. However, the many lessons learned at the beginning of Covid and throughout the year helped ESG to navigate these challenging times. Last fall, we re-opened and resumed in-person worship at the beginning of September. Unfortunately, Covid numbers were on the rise so it was decided to stop worshipping in-person and resume pre-recorded online services. The ministerial team together with members of the congregation moved ahead with the worship plan without missing a beat. Members were able to watch the service from our website or on Facebook either on Sundays or another time that worked for them. We also added a further worship option, worship by phone, for those without access to a computer.

Worship highlights from this past year included:

- **Unglamorous:** A 5-week Starter Course on Race and Inequality from a Christian Framework created for ESG by Heather Beamish, a spoken word artist, to explore this theme during Lent.
- **Artistry of God** series for the Season of Easter: God the Weaver, God the Potter, God the Gardener, God the Quilter, God the Mosaic Artist and God the Graffiti /Mural Artist. The series showcased the talents and passions within our ESG community and was championed by members of the Worship, Sacraments and Music committee.
- **Summer Worship series** with guest preachers from a number of North Toronto Cluster churches and members of our ESG community.

Through creative application of technical skills by our in-house ESG production team, our choir leads continued to bring us the gift of their talents weekly and the gift of our full choir performing together virtually through **40+ Windows/Screens**. Zoom coffee hours following the services also continued offering members a way to connect virtually, chat and catch up and were hosted by a dedicated group of ESG members.

This fall, we have resumed in-person worship. We will also continue to offer online worship, presented by live-streaming on Sunday mornings, so members can still watch from home in real time or later if they prefer. Zoom Coffee Hours also continue.



Some of this year's worship themes:





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## Music

Who could have imagined that we would sing apart but together for a whole year, and more? We met once every two weeks from fall to spring to rehearse on Zoom, and produced six pieces of choral music for worship services. Our leads recorded anthems, as a group and in smaller ensembles, for inclusion in the services. The learning curve was steep for some of us in recording ourselves for Bryan Estabrooks, who so ably put us all together.

Our choir grew with guest choristers during the year! We were pleased to include some singers from local churches where choir was not taking place, and some from as far distant as Dawson, Yukon, Salt Spring Island, BC, and Truro, NS. In all, we had about seventeen guests join us for rehearsals and recordings. We invited singers from Shawn's Orangeville community choir, the Achill Choral Society, to join us for two of the recordings in the spring.

We sang in a virtual Christmas concert that was very well-received by audiences near and far, who supported us generously. We used material from previous live concerts and added new pieces by the leads and the full choir. Watch for another Christmas concert this year!

We initiated a New Expressions Music series at ESG, which was created to provide different music experiences in the worship service. We welcomed Jazz/Musical Theatre soloist Lyla Miklos in October, the Vox Youth Choir in November, and in December, Tom Leighton and Anne Lederman, who presented a Celtic Christmas. Because of Covid, we had to suspend the series in January; however, we adjusted to create a musical component to complement the Lent Unglamorous series, which featured guest artists.

Emily Taub and Meghan Jamieson worked virtually with the Vox Youth Choir and prepared recordings for Christmas and the spring. Their efforts were much appreciated and enjoyed.

Until it is safe to be together, physically distanced, wearing our new singers' masks (in which we look a little like platypuses or long-billed ducks), we will continue to sing through our Zoom rehearsals and recordings. The leads will continue to provide music leadership during services as the congregation returns to the sanctuary.

Our choir community remains a caring, strong part of the congregation at ESG.

## Property

### Maintenance and Repairs

Over the past year, property maintenance on the church infrastructure included:

- Repairs of damages due to an invasion of a family of raccoons
- Replaced heating system equipment (pumps and valves)
- Repaired the door operator for the grade level Lytton entrance, which was destroyed by vandals attempting to gain access to the mailbox.
- Relocated the mail box inside the Duplex Avenue doors with a slot for access and security
- Repairs to the heating system (pumps and valves)
- Repairs to metal window cladding

### Special Projects

**Driveway:** Work was completed in late fall of 2020

**HVAC:** A maintenance contract for the heating and cooling systems was renewed with Power Application Group Inc.

**Storage room Roof Slab:** On the recommendation of an engineering assessment of the concrete slab roof over the storage room adjacent to the west wall of the gymnasium, jacking posts were installed as a precautionary measure to take the load of the deteriorating ceiling slab until a permanent solution can be implemented.



**Water Damage:** Repaired the drainage piping in the west window wells and basement storage room to channel the runoff rainwater into a collection tank from which it is pumped to the main drains system.

**Lift to the Gym:** Purchased and installed a new lift from the lower hall way to the gym. Property Committee coordinated the contractors and managed the project.

**Family Ministry:** Consulted and provided quotations for storage cabinets and counters for the Children's Ministry Room as well as for plans to create a new space for the youth group.

**Building Automation System (BAS):** Software changes have been implemented to accommodate the addition of timers for window lighting and remote access control to the building.

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**Sound System:** The new sound and video systems were configured to accommodate both in-person and live-streamed worship services and has performed well. Additional Wi-Fi access points have been installed in the Sanctuary.

**Audio Video/ Information Technology Team:** A team was formed to review and catalogue the church assets; primarily the AV/IT equipment; to develop system descriptions, operating procedures and training and system connection points or interfaces as well as identifying those responsible for the maintenance and safe operation of each system.

# Governing Responsibly

## Trustees Report

The ESG Board of Trustees holds all of the property of ESG for the congregation along with the church's endowed and restricted funds. The ESG property includes the church's real estate and investment funds. The ESG Trustees meet to receive reports on and discuss property issues, to review all investment funds and to monitor the performance by our asset manager. In addition, the trustees consider ways to use monies from the endowed and restricted funds to support the work of the church both within our walls and in the larger community.

The ESG trust funds are in managed investment accounts and, over the 2020-2021 fiscal year, the funds experienced strong performance in line with the markets. Overall, the funds have also had good returns over the longer term.

This year, in addition to supporting our own operating, music and property maintenance needs, trust funds were used to assist in funding the accessible lift project at ESG, to provide funding for the Summer Gardening Project, to renew ESG financial support for a PhD student in Theological (Liturgical) Studies at Emmanuel College and to provide support for a Master of Divinity student at the Vancouver School of Theology.

It is important for the long term future of the church that these trust funds continue to grow so that we can collectively live out our goals as a congregation and continue to build the ministry we share together.

Fund reports are included in yearly ESG financial reports and are part of yearly audits. No new business arose in the past year that requires congregational input.

## Financial Report

We ended the fiscal year June 30, 2021 in a positive financial position.

The following is a high level recap:

(Please refer to the Audited Financial Statements for details.)


- Our donations increased by **\$8,845 (1%)** from the previous year due to year end appeal and major donor.
- Our rental revenues decreased by **\$32,000 (-18%)** due to COVID. (\$150,014 vs \$182,031)
- Our revenues from Programs, Events, Grants & Miscellaneous includes \$65,952 received from the Canada Employment Wage Subsidy.
- Our operating expenses were carefully reviewed due to the pandemic and reduced **below budget by 4.6%**.
- We received **\$53,483** in undesignated bequests.
